History of Youth Apprenticeships in Maryland

- In 2015, House Bill 942 established a pilot program for Youth Apprenticeships to prepare students to enter the workforce by providing on-site employment training and related classroom instruction needed to obtain a license or certification for a skilled occupation. The pilot program began in the summer of 2016 and lasted for two years
- In 2018, MSDE and the Department of Labor expanded the Apprenticeship Maryland Program (AMP) to be a permanent state-wide program as a Career and Technical Education (CTE) Program of Study
- The Apprenticeship Maryland Program quickly expanded from the
 2 pilot counties to ALL of the 24 districts across Maryland

Youth/High School Apprenticeships in Maryland

- The Apprenticeship Maryland Program (AMP) is a Maryland CTE Program of Study
- A youth apprentice receives supervised, structured, on-the-job training from a mentor in a specific in-demand occupation
- Youth apprentices work a minimum of 450 hours with a certified employer.
 Participating students typically work during the summer after their junior year and during their senior year
- Youth apprentices also participate in a classroom-setting related instruction, as set by the employer










HCPS Apprenticeship Maryland Program (AMP) History




- Apprenticeship and Workforce Development Teacher Specialists hired as part of the Maryland Works Grant
- 110 approved business partners (15 more on the March Maryland Apprenticeship and Training Council agenda)





Expansion of Youth/High School Apprenticeships in Maryland



As of February 2024...

- Around 1,000 AMP students throughout Maryland
- 125 of these students attend an HCPS school
- HCPS over 10% of total AMP students throughout Maryland
- AMP student at each HCPS high school

Blueprint Goal: 45% of graduating seniors by the 2030-2031 school year complete an apprenticeship or achieve an industry-recognized occupational credential.





Benefits for Business

- Helps create skilled employees ready to enter the workforce
- Simplify the hiring process- HCPS Specialist will send cover letter and resumes for review
- Retain employees after graduation (full-time, part-time, college internships)
- Agree to mentor and pay at least minimum wage
- **Process**: initial meeting with HCPS and identify related instruction, submit online application to MDL, site visit by Apprenticeship Navigator/HCPS, Navigator presents to MATC for approval, interview and hire
- Once approved, hire student(s) that you feel best fit your company
- Public and Privately owned businesses- Harford County Public Schools and Harford County Government both have AMP students currently employed





Student Information


- Good attendance and be on track for graduation


