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

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

students who use the power of reading, writing, speaking, and thinking to make a mark on the world. There is no better prize than this.



She has organized and led the Kids Inclusion Club, assisted in coordinating community-based instruction trips and organized service learning projects. At the county level, Ms. Jurgs has facilitated professional development for teachers. She has also served as teacher mentor.

Introduction Transcript:

"Hi! My name is Kaitlyn Marchman. I would like to tell you a little bit about my teacher of the year - Ms. Jurgs. In our classroom, my friend Hannah started calling all of the teachers just by their last name. We aren't being disrespectful, it's just how we talk. Actually, it is really important to me to be treated with respect. A friend of mine at school kept talking to me like I was a baby. I was getting mad, but I couldn't tell him because I can't talk like you do. Jurgs knows me. She went and explained that I needed to be treated like the cool 15-year-old I am. Well.. ok... I added the "cool" part. I felt so much better and was able to be better behaved and learn while this friend was around.

My classmates and I are smart and have many talents. We just need extra help to learn. This is not done in your regular classroom-type setting. I want to explain it to you by comparing it to my favorite football team, the Ravens! Jurgs is the head coach. Our principal, Mr. Jensen, is the owner. When we needed more classroom space and a sensory room, Jurgs went to Mr. Jensen to get it done. All of the inclusion helpers are like the assistant coaches. They take direction from Jurgs and learn how to help each of us differently. Just like you would help a kicker differently from a punt returner, even though they are both on special teams. We go to general education classes for things like science, social studies, PE, and UA. General educators are like the offensive, defensive, and special team coordinators. They know the curriculum best, but Jurgs needs to modify the material for us. Jurgs will make a science test so my friends and I can show what we learned. Just like any player, I love when I do awesome on a test.

As our head coach, Jurgs does many things but most importantly, she makes sure we are learning. Like coach Harbaugh, she has extremely high expectations. Some days I will give her a special look and she knows what I mean... "Come on Jurgs! It's Friday afternoon! Don't set the bar so high." Does she listen to me? Nope! We still have to do our best.

I hope this helps you understand all of us a little better. The funny thing is, until this year, Jurgs never watched a football game. The only reason she did is because she knew how important the Ravens are to me. I laughed really hard when she had to go to Mr. Andreen to ask him what I was talking about. He had to translate.

Just like I taught Jurgs about football... My mom wants me to tell you that Jurgs taught me to read after many people said it couldn't be done. Just like the Ravens would have never gone and won the Super Bowl without an outstanding head coach, well, my classmates and I would not have grown so much without Jurgs."
